FARIBAULT FOUNDATION A TRUE COMMUNITY PROJECT

The City of Faribault is excited to be constructing an all-season park within walking distance of downtown that will attract people from across the area to gather, splash, skate, exercise, and listen to live music, among many other things.

The construction of phase one of Viaduct Park, which will feature a splash pad, park building/ restrooms, green space, and many decorative touches, is currently underway with an anticipated opening date of Fall 2025. Phase two of the park, which the Faribault City Council is continuing to fine-tune to ensure the most cost-effective approach, will include a refrigerated ice-skating surface. A park of this caliber is sure to become a downtown hotspot that allows the community and regional visitors the opportunity for a unique and unparalleled experience within the Faribault park system. The daily drop-in recreational opportunities and other general public use (outside of reserved, exclusive use for private events and/or organized programming) will be free of charge for participation.

The preliminary cost estimate for the first phase is approximately \$6 million, and the City is funding the construction with an internal loan from the Sewer Fund to the Parkland Dedication Fund for the costs of the project that will be repaid overtime with gas and electric franchise fees.

In addition, the City is working with the Faribault Foundation to offer opportunities for businesses, organizations, families, and individuals to participate and be recognized as part of this important community project.

FOUNDATION TO HOW WE GOT HERE

The City of Faribault owns approximately 2.7 acres of property on the eastern edge of its historic downtown, and is planning for the construction of a four-season recreational park after years of strategically planning to use parkland as a catalyst for positive change within the City's Downtown Historic District.

Since the approval of the 2040 Community Vision in 2015, the City of Faribault has worked to provide the downtown area with a recreation space to serve residents and visitors, and to provide outdoor recreation opportunities to an under-served area of the community.

Along with Vision 2040 were two standalone, yet coordinated plans the "Downtown Master Plan," and the "Parks, Trails, and Open Space Plan" - which were adopted by the City Council in 2019. Like the Vision 2040, these plans - designed with a heavy focus on community engagement - include the development of a key public park on the east side of the downtown.

As noted in the Master Plan, one key component to guiding positive future growth near the historic downtown is to "embrace the river." The unique relationship between downtown Faribault and the Straight River is critical to the community, even since the beginning of the town's establishment. The Straight River was vital to the inception of downtown and a key factor to Alexander Faribault's decision to put roots down in Faribault.

With substantial investment being made within the downtown district, and with the welcoming of nearly 250 new apartment units within walking distance, the development of a regional park of this magnitude represents a unique opportunity: adding more people to the equation is viewed as a primary catalyst for boosting activity, and as a result, vibrancy.

Additionally, parks with a regional focus have the potential to significantly increase the number of visitors to Faribault and result in a positive economic impact. Unique features such as splash pads, and bridge lighting, along with unparalleled access to City and State trails, have been shown to increase visitorship in other communities, and will add immense value to Faribault's park and trail system.

This complementary relationship between both local and regional usage creates a more dynamic and vibrant area.

A development like this not only raises the standard of living in our city, but will also spark economic activity that can have a ripple effect well beyond any initial expenditure.





VIADUCT PARK CONCEPTS - PHASE ONE

MULTI-PURPOSE BUILDING:

Whether you're looking for a place to grab a hot cocoa and warm your toes, or perusing facilities for a birthday party, this multi-purpose building will be suitable for just about any event. In addition to housing the mechanical room for the rest of the park's amenities, it will also include restrooms for park-goers and trail users, a concession stand, a gathering area and party/gathering room.

SPLASH PAD:

This non-slip, open-area water feature will allow people of all ages the opportunity to take a walk under or through a variety of fountains, mists and sprays. This nature-themed splash pad will be just what the community is looking for on a hot summer day. Complementing the water features will be a designated area for a shade structure.

OPEN PLAY:

Sometimes, the most attractive feature within a park is open space, lined with beautiful landscaping, which will prominently be on display throughout Viaduct Park. With room for a portable stage and designated location for a shade structure, this gathering area also serves as the site for enjoying outdoor music. Grab a book, a picnic blanket and enjoy the scenes along the Straight River.

LANDSCAPING, BENCHES, AND MORE: With its location near the river, and along the City trail, there will be ample opportunity for community members to host a picnic, enjoy bird-watching or simply grab a spot on a bench and take in all of the fun around you. With flowers plentiful, permanent swinging benches and more, Viaduct Park will be a beloved destination for community members and visitors alike.

FUTURE ITEMS PLANNED:

SKATING RIBBON:

One of the biggest attractions of Viaduct Park will be the permanent, outdoor refrigerated ice-skating surface, ensuring usable ice no matter what Mother Nature throws our way in the colder months. This skating area will be completed in Phase 2 and may be used for roller blading and more during the non-ice season.

OUTDOOR FITNESS EQUIPMENT:

With nearly 15 miles of City trail throughout Faribault, it's no wonder our highly active community has been requesting outdoor fitness equipment. And with the trail running just alongside this park, its accessible and convenient location will allow those novice to experienced the opportunity to begin exercising in a beautiful setting. With an array of different stations, a full-body work out is now available to everyone - no membership needed.

UNDER-BRIDGE LIGHTING:

There are few landmarks in the City of Faribault that are as recognizable as the Viaduct, and the City plans to use this feature to its fullest extent with underlighting below the bridge to add a unique touch to the regional park. With its large presence, and well-established history, lighting will give the Viaduct a new appearance and allow the City to further embrace its rich character.

MURALS:

Only behind this town's adoration for historic features will you find a similar love for the art. Whether it's Bruce Smith donning the downtown landscape, Bishop Henry Whipple adorning the Central Park Bandshell, or the more recent LOVE mural across from City Hall, art is on display nearly everywhere you look. And with a perfect canvas awaiting an artist - so, too, will Viaduct Park.









FARIBAULT FOUNDATION FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

MAJOR RECOGNITION DONATIONS:

Often times when proposing a park of this magnitude, organizations, businesses, families, and individuals wish to make a significant contribution to not only ensure timely development by donating towards the cost of construction, but also to partner with the City in giving back to the community through this valuable addition to the City of Faribault park system.

For this project, recognition of significant and targeted donations may be accomplished through the naming of identified facilities and major amenities being constructed in the park. Naming could include a business or organization, or be named in honor of a family or individual at the request of the donor.

The City's Facilities Naming Policy allows the City Council to use its discretion as to what dollar amount is worthy of naming rights for individual projects and/or amenities, on a case-by-case basis. The Faribault Foundation will provide general guidelines on the level of donation required to grant donors naming rights for different facilities and amenities.


